



Lecturer/Artist-in-Residence of Voice

The College of Idaho invites applications for a full-time Lecturer/Artist-in-Residence position in the Music Department with a specialty in Voice to start Fall 2023. We seek candidates who share the College's <u>commitment</u> to creating an equitable and inclusive academic community through their teaching, mentoring, and service.

The Music Department at The College of Idaho serves a large portion of the school population. Students can major or minor in music, but many of the students on campus take music courses out of personal interest. Within our PEAK Curriculum, all students must have at least a minor in the Humanities and Fine Arts. Thus, the objective of the Music Department broadly covers both the training of the professional musician and providing a meaningful musical experience for all students within the college.

The course expectations of the Lecturer position include, but are not limited to, a large studio of private voice lessons, consisting of students with varied skill levels and genre pursuits, and a two-year rotation of the following courses:

- MUS-135 Class Voice
- MUS-215 Survey of Opera History
- MUS-238 English and German Diction
- MUS-239 French and Italian Diction
- MUS-327 Musical Theatre/Opera Workshop (January Term)
- MUS-333 Vocal Pedagogy and Literature
- MUS-490 Junior/Senior Recitals

In addition, this position is expected to work closely with the choral department in developing consistent voice habits across the entire vocal department. This position has also traditionally served as the director for the staged productions of the Music Department, including either opera scenes or a full-staged production, in coordination with the choral director.

Qualifications

A graduate degree in vocal performance, vocal pedagogy, or a closely related area is desired. Preference will be given to applicants with teaching experience and/or a terminal degree. Appointment to the rank of Lecturer is renewable annually without limit, subject to review by faculty and college leadership.

Candidates must be authorized to work in the United States as of the expected hire date and throughout the date of the contract without sponsorship from the College.

Preferred Qualifications

- Terminal degree in vocal performance and/or pedagogy
- Studio and classroom teaching experience
- Soprano, Mezzo-Soprano, or Contralto voice type
- Significant performance experience both in stage work and concert solo work
- Research in vocal pedagogy, both historically and current scientific application
- Experience staging theatrical/opera productions
- Experience teaching contemporary and musical theatre styles
- Knowledge of diverse repertoire for a broad array of students

Application instructions

Review of candidates will begin immediately and continue until the position is filled.

Applications should include:

- A letter of interest
- Curriculum Vitae
- Teaching philosophy in the context of a liberal arts education
- A separate statement describing how your commitment to diversity and inclusion are demonstrated in your teaching, scholarship, or service
- Transcripts (unofficial transcripts are accepted)

Applicants may be asked to provide the following after initial review:

- At least three letters of recommendation
- Video footage of recent classroom/studio teaching or performance
