



## **Philosophy, Assistant Professor**

The College of Idaho invites applications for an Assistant Professor of Philosophy to begin in Fall 2023. We seek candidates whose teaching, research, and service will contribute to our commitment to an equitable and inclusive learning and work environment.

The area of specialization is open, but the Philosophy and Religious Studies Department is particularly interested in candidates who can contribute to our divisional learning outcome of “engagement with non-dominant cultures and cultural products.” The successful candidate will be a generalist able to teach Critical Thinking/Introduction to Logic, Early Modern Philosophy (broadly conceived), and a wide range of electives that are accessible to non-majors (including upper-division courses in the candidate’s specialization).

### **Qualifications**

A terminal degree in philosophy is required. ABD candidates will be considered. Candidates must be authorized to work in the United States as of the expected hire date and throughout the date of the contract without sponsorship from the College.

### **Application instructions**

Review of candidates will begin November 1, 2022 and continue until the position is filled.

Applications should include:

- A letter of interest,
- Curriculum Vitae,
- Teaching philosophy in the context of a liberal arts education,
- A statement describing how your commitment to diversity and inclusion are demonstrated in your teaching, scholarship, and/or service,
- Transcripts (unofficial transcripts are accepted), and
- Three letters of recommendation.
