NIH does not use the role of Co-PI (https://grants.nih.gov/grants/funding/top-r15-submission-errors.htm)

- Use collaborator, consultant, or subcontractor for those who will not be serving as Multiple PD/PI.
- For Multiple PI, use PD/PI role for each. Remember each must be eligible for an R15.

When multiple PD/PIs are proposed, must all PD/PIs and all institutions involved be AREA-eligible? (http://grants.nih.gov/grants/funding/area_faq.htm#4044)

• Yes, each PD/PI must have an appointment at an AREA-eligible institution. In addition, each PD/PI may not be the PD/PI of an active NIH grant at the time of award of an AREA grant.

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
